International Green Wine Competition awards 153 outstanding gold, silver and bronze wines for eco-conscious consumers

IN THE FIRST COMPETITION of its kind, 15 of the world's acknowledged leaders in wines made from organic and biodynamically grown grapes (including Oregon's Susan Sokol Blosser) identified a total of 153 award-winning wines.

Consumer's Green Wine Shopping List, which indexes all winners by medal and by company, including prices and websites.

"The 2008 Consumer's Green Wine Shopping List solves the problem of 'which green wines are 'can't miss' for the organic-minded consumer,'" said Lea Pierce, founder and director of Wine Competition Management, LLC, the organizer of the event. The list includes educational information on this year's four competition classes, ranging from wines made from biodynamically and organically grown grapes, to transitional and natural grapes.

Under the leadership of honorary chairman Paul Dolan, America's pioneer in organic winemaking, 15 judges evaluated a total of 271 entries from six states (California, Oregon, Washington, Arizona, Texas and Illinois) and 11 foreign countries, including Cyprus, Portugal, Canada, Chile, Argentina, Italy, Spain, France, Lebanon, New Zealand and Australia. Approximately 63 percent entered their wines as certified organic.
